GROUND-BASED RADAR UNIT INTELLIGENCE OPERATIONS

This regulation outlines the responsibilities for intelligence at ANG ground radar units at the Air Control Group (ACG), Air Control Squadrons (ACS), and Air Defense Squadrons (ADS). It implements AFP 14-2 and covers in garrison and deployed activities in a non-mobilized posture. This regulation is rescinded in the event of a mobilization.

1. General. This regulation outlines the intelligence functions to be accomplished by unit intelligence. The intelligence chief at each unit is responsible for assuring the intelligence section's responsiveness to operational requirements within the unit. The intelligence function will provide intelligence support to the unit tasking. The key to mission success in the unit is an effective operations/intelligence interface. Use this regulation in conjunction with the ACC Intelligence Handbook and other ACC 200-series regulations as applicable.

2. Additional Duties. Intelligence personnel will not be assigned additional duties or details which interfere with their tasking or intelligence support responsibilities. The IN or intelligence chief will monitor the assignment of additional duties.

3. OPLAN Responsibilities. The unit intelligence chief will assure that unit plans are reviewed to identify intelligence support and intelligence collection requirements. Group and squadron intelligence personnel will receive the unit plans briefing.

4. Self-Inspections. Intelligence self-inspections will be conducted and documented in the Air Control Group and Air Control Squadrons IAW local directives at least annually. Tailored check-lists/self assessment guides will be used during the inspections. Squadrons will send a copy of each self-inspection to the ACG/IN documenting their findings.

5. Management of Intelligence Reference Files. Intelligence reference files should reflect the units mission requirements and consist of documents which would be needed to support all unit specific tasking.

6. Written Instructions. If regulations or written instructions from outside of the intelligence section

are in effect which specify procedures, then local instruction does not need to be written. Policies and procedures will be formalized in written instructions to standardize performance or provide continuity. Written instructions may be in group or squadron directives, such as regulations, continuity files, plans, DO or IN operating instructions, training binders, checklists or other forms. Local written instructions will address the following subjects as a minimum:

- 6.1. Organization, manpower, and responsibilities of intelligence.
- 6.2. Self-inspection procedures.
- 6.3. Intelligence document management.
- 6.4. Training of intelligence personnel within the unit.
- 6.5. Intelligence support to TACS personnel in the unit.
- 6.6. Security.
- 6.7. Emergency protection or removal of classified materials.
- 6.8. Map and chart materials management.
- 6.9. Mobility preparation/procedures.
- 6.10. Briefing/debriefing/reporting procedures.
- 6.11. Support to unit programs, e.g., Checkered Flag, weapons and tactics, system training programs.
- 6.12. Intelligence oversight program.
- 6.13. Current intelligence support.

6.14. Order of battle displays.

7. Maps, Charts, and Target Materials. AFI 14-205/ACC Sup 1 directs units to appoint a mapping and charting custodian. The mapping custodian personnel will requisition, control, and inventory the maps and charts needed to support the unit mission and tasking. AFI 14-205/ACC Sup 1 outlines procedures for submission of requisitions for maps and charts. It gives specific instructions for completing requisition forms, processing emergency requests, assigning classifications, and managing unit stock levels. AFI 14-205/ACC Sup 1 covers maps, charts and target materials for exercises, contingency operations, and staff planning.

8. Intelligence Training. Reports of completed intelligence training are forwarded to the ACG Group Intelligence Section.

8.1. Intelligence personnel in the unit will develop specific intelligence training requirements and objectives for their units. Interface with the Checkered Flag, weapons and tactics, and system training programs is recommended.

8.2. Unit intelligence personnel will forward a statement of what training was performed for unit/operations personnel by the last day of the quarter.

9. Mobility and Deployment Preparation. Mobility and deployment procedures will vary depending on each unit's function, (i.e. ACG, CRC, CRE) and its deployed intelligence resources. As a minimum, unit intelligence personnel will:

9.1. Closely review the operations plans for unit tasking.

9.2. Coordinate with the unit DO for identifying intelligence documents to be deployed.

9.3. Coordinate with the unit logistics function for inclusion and processing of documents, expendable supplies, and/or other items in the unit mobility plan.

9.4. Present the initial situation brief.

9.5. ACG TACS (Theater Air Control System) - Specific Intelligence Functions. Squadron intelligence functions are performed by Intelligence

Officers (IO), Additional-Duty Intelligence Officers (ADIO), Additional-Duty Intelligence Noncommissioned Officers (ADINCO), depending on the unit's tasking requirements and authorizations. Each squadron will identify their new intelligence personnel by letter to the ACG/IN NLT 30 days after appointment to the position.

10. Intelligence Personnel Training. Each unit is responsible for ensuring that upgrade training, orientation training, and continuation training are provided to personnel with an intelligence AFSC within their respective organization. Collocated units may integrate their training program to enhance the training program's efficiency. Upgrade training guidance is contained in AFI 36-2201, (formerly AFR SO-23, *Enlisted Specialty Training*). Orientation and continuation training requirements may be used to complement upgrade training, and are outlined below. Squadrons will annually identify individual intelligence personnel training progress to the ACG/IN.

10.1. Orientation Training. The training requirements listed below are mandatory for all intelligence personnel in an intelligence AFSC. This training will be completed in the first six UTA's of arrival on station or commencement of training. Training may be extended if necessary. Document this training using whatever method is the most convenient.

10.1.1. TACS mission and organization.

10.1.2. Unit mission and organization.

10.1.3. Unit-specific intelligence support functions.

10.1.4. Unit operations plans/order tasking.

10.1.5. Maps and chart orientation (unit specific).

10.1.6. Unit Checkered Flag program/theater operations.

10.1.7. Orientation visit/briefing to a unit performing a live aircraft control function.

10.1.8. Unit microcomputer orientation.

10.1.9. Intelligence oversight program.

10.1.10. Weapons and tactics program.

10.2. Continuation Training. This consists of qualification training and familiarization training. The training requirements listed below are mandatory for all intelligence personnel within intelligence AFSC. This training should be completed in the first eighteen months of arrival on station or commencement of training and reviewed annually thereafter. Training may be extended if necessary.

10.2.1 Unit self-inspection program.

10.2.2. Checkered Flag.

10.2.3. Weapons and tactics.

10.2.4. Operations/STE training.

10.2.5. Operations plans.

10.2.6. Intelligence reports (USMTF).

10.2.7. Intelligence oversight program.

11. Weapons and Tactics/Intelligence Interface.

Intelligence personnel will work closely with unit Weapons and Tactics (DOW) to align intelligence training with training provided by weapons and tactics personnel. Intelligence personnel will coordinate with weapons and tactics personnel concerning the information and training materials they need to perform their duties.

12. Checkered Flag/Intelligence Interface.

Intelligence personnel will work closely with Checkered Flag personnel to provide intelligence materials for the Checkered Flag program. This includes contributing to the Unit Readiness Brief (URB) and the Area Familiarization Training Program (AFTP).

13. Intelligence Support.

Group and squadron intelligence will provide support during simulated and actual exercises and/or operations.

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
